Manager's Message

The State of Vermont Health Department reported a recent case of rabies in a raccoon in the Town of Colchester. The State was able to share just the nearest cross-street location, which is Colchester Point Road. **Please take steps to protect humans and pets from rabies.**

If you are bitten by an animal: wash the wound very well with soap and water and contact your health care provider. Follow all their instructions.

If your pet or farm animal was exposed to a wild or stray animal that might have rabies contact your veterinarian. Pets should be vaccinated for rabies. State law requires dogs and cats to be vaccinated — even barn cats.

If you see a wild or stray animal acting strangely, or are concerned about a rabies exposure, call the Rabies Hotline (1-800-4-RABIES), or report it to your town's animal control officer.

Do not touch or pick up wild or stray animals – even baby animals – or try to make them into pets. Doing so can put yourself or your family at risk of exposure through a bite or a scratch. You can't tell if an animal has rabies just by looking at it. Interacting with young wildlife may result in them being orphaned or, if tested for rabies, requires humanely euthanizing the animal. So, for their own sake, leave wildlife in the wild.

Rabies is a deadly viral disease of the brain that infects mammals and is fatal to both humans and animals. In Vermont, rabies is most commonly found in wild animals such as raccoons, skunks, foxes, bats and woodchucks. Cats, dogs and livestock can also get rabies if they have not been vaccinated. Rabies virus is spread through the bite of an infected animal. Rabies is transmitted only when the virus is introduced into a bite wound, open cuts on the skin, or onto mucous membranes, like the mouth or eyes.



Public EV Charger Update: The new, level 2 electric vehicle (EV) charger will have two charging ports in front of the Colchester Town Offices. A contract was executed for the work in December of 2022, and the charger is currently on order. The site work for the project has been completed, and the actual charger will hopefully be delivered within the next two



months. The charger will have a credit card payment system for public use. The total cost of the project is \$14,199.

Volunteer Opportunity with the Selective Service System: The Selective Service System (SSS) is looking for individuals to serve, in a volunteer capacity, as a Local Board Member.



The Selective Service System is an independent agency within the Executive Branch of the U.S. Federal Government who register men and maintain a system that, when authorized by the President and Congress, rapidly provides personnel in a fair and equitable manner while managing an alternative service program for conscientious objectors. The Selective Service System is not part of the Department of Defense; the SSS is responsible for availability of young men while the Department of Defense is responsible for acceptability in the event of a draft. Codes and Ciphers
Saturday, June 10, 10 – 11 a.m.

Fee: \$5 per child

In use for thousands of years, codes and ciphers can be simple to amazingly complex. The focus

for this class will be on basic codes that children will use to code their name and maybe a secret message. The instructor will demonstrate Atbash, Grid, Caesar Cipher, and Scytale. Each child will go home with cipher wheels and code sheets to continue using the knowledge learned. This class, open to ages 8-10, is a nice STEM activity. Class size is limited to 8 children.



Old Time Toys

Saturday, June 17, 10 - 11 a.m.

Fee: \$5 per child

Before toy stores, children were shown how to make toys from scraps and items that were in almost every home in the era of the Colchester Log Schoolhouse. Yarn, paper, fabric, and clothes pins made charming toys for young children. Every child will make and take home one or two simple toys. This class is limited to 8 children between kindergarten age and 2nd grade.

Math Games

Saturday, June 24, 10 - 11 a.m.

Fee: \$5 per child

For a very long time and across many continents, children have played variations of some really great games that only required paper, pencils, and game tokens. These screen-free math games help develop strategic and critical thinking, boost memory and mathematical confidence, and can be successfully played by math lovers and those who have not yet learned to love math.


This class is for children ages 7 to 10 and is open for 8 students. The students will bring home examples of the games they learned to share with their family.

Department Updates
