Exit 16 DDI Traffic Control: The Vermont Agency of Transportation (VTrans) is improving the roadway along the U.S. Routes 2/7 (U.S. 2/7) corridor, in the vicinity of Interstate 89 (I-89) Exit 16, to enhance mobility and safety in Colchester. Since this is a State Highway, the State of VT is in charge of



this project, and they are responsible for the hiring of flaggers and off-duty police and Sheriffs to maintain traffic control within the project limits. Any efforts by Colchester Police to control traffic would affect other areas of the project because assigning uniformed officers to control the middle of construction areas is counterproductive and not in line with traffic plans approved and designed by traffic engineers. Bear Coexistence PSA from Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department:

Bear activity typically increases in June, so the Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department is reminding everyone that now is an especially important time to secure food sources that could attract bears to your neighborhood.



At this time of year, unsecured garbage is the single biggest cause of bear conflicts in our state. Here are three steps for keeping your garbage from attracting bears:

- **Dispose of garbage frequently.** If you have pick-up services, wait until the morning to put your garbage out.
- Make your garbage inaccessible. Store garbage in a secure structure and a bear proof container. Learn how to make your garbage can bear proof here:

- **Demand bear proof dumpsters for your community.** Your garbage hauler should be able to provide these.



Visit the Log Schoolhouse this Summer: Colchester's historic Log Schoolhouse will be open on weekends this summer, June through August, 10 a.m.-2 p.m., Friday–Monday. This 24- x 28-foot log structure was originally one of the earliest schoolhouses in Colchester, built circa 1815. It is located within Airport Park at 500 Colchester Point Road. Today, the Colchester Log Schoolhouse functions as a visitor information center, interpretive venue for schools, and a museum for displaying Colchester history. Students of all ages are

encouraged to visit this lovely little historic site to step back in time to the days of early school education. Parking and admission are free, but donations are always appreciated.

Road trip! You've probably already seen most of our town's local historical sites. Or have you? And how much do you really know about them? The Colchester Historical Society invites you to enjoy its Self-Guided Driving Tour of over forty local historical landmarks this summer.





The tour is divided into four general geographical areas: Colchester Village, Malletts Bay, Airport Park, and Fort Ethan Allen. In addition, there is a section that covers six local cemeteries. The Historical Society recommends that you begin your tour on Main Street at the Bicentennial sign (pictured), located between Burnham Memorial Library and the Meeting House, and go from there. Select your own route, depending on your interests and time schedule. There's no waiting, no fees, and no rush. Visit all of the landmarks, or pick and

choose, as you wish.

This award-winning Self-Guided Driving Tour provides a wonderful opportunity to learn about the origins of Colchester Pond, the professional baseball career of one of our local residents, the Vermont National Guard Museum, Niquette Bay State Park, local churches, Fort Ethan Allen, Colchester Bog, and many more sites of historical interest.
