


#### **Dues are Now Due**

While there is already much information out there about Ira Allen, Vermont author J. #### 10th Cavalry Housing Renovation Underway



Former military barracks at Fort Ethan Allen that once housed members of the 10th Cavalry, known as the "Buffalo Soldiers" are currently being renovated and modernized. These buildings were constructed in 1894 at a cost of \$37,600.55 and were designed to hold 200 men each. For those 200 men, there were 12 toilets, 8 urinals, and 12 bathtubs. In 1910, the buildings were upgraded to include four showers/baths. Until 1905, mineral oil provided light, and heat was provided by steam. The Fort was eventually decommissioned and closed in 1944. In more recent years, these buildings were purchased by St. Michael's College and were adapted to serve as student housing and offices.

pamphlet for Camp Winnahkee, once located on Coates Island. "Winnahkee" is a Native American word meaning "Camp of the Birch Grove." The camp for young women cost \$300 for the season. The 1916 brochure states: "Cost of a girl's summer in camp should be considered an investment, not an expense, for the benefit she receives there is one which will continue with her throughout her life." The booklet contains several pages of photographs, song lyrics, poetry, and camp rules of conduct.




Image of a 1959 desktop calendar – probably a holiday gift for customers

## Local UFO Abduction – Believe It or Not?




UFO/astronomy consultant Walter N. Webb published a book in 1994, *Encounter at Buff Ledge – A UFO Case History*. It details an intensive study about an alleged UFO sighting and abduction that occurred in 1968 on the dock at Buff Ledge Camp (off Clay Point Road) here in Colchester. The subjects of the study were eye-witnesses/victims who were teenage camp counselors enjoying a quiet evening on the dock when they noticed

strange lights in the sky. For years, the two did not discuss their experience. However, the young man, known in the book as Michael, remembered many of the unsettling details, and ten years later reported the incident. He and the other witness/victim, Janet, underwent a series of hypnosis sessions in an effort to further explore what had happened.

Believable or not, it's an intriguing story to discover. Did it really happen? Decide for yourself. Read the details, look at the images, and check out the author's evaluation and conclusion. The book is available for loan at the <u>Brownell Library</u> in Essex Junction, and copies of the book may be purchased (\$14 including postage and handling) from the publisher by check payable to <u>Center for UFO Studies</u> (CUFOS), P.
