Historic Schoolhouse Opens for Summer



This image shows part of the restoration process of the Colchester Log Schoolhouse. The structure was one of the earliest schoolhouses in Colchester, built circa 1815. The 24-foot by 28-foot building is made of square-hewn white pine measuring seven inches wide and up to 15 inches high. In 2001, the Colchester Historical Society formed a committee to save and renovate the building. Today, it functions as a lovely visitor information center and museum that showcases some of our Town's wonderful history and heritage.

Come visit this summer and take a lovely step back in time. New this year is an opportunity for visiting children to learn to craft a small vintage toy. The Colchester Log Schoolhouse is open to visitors all summer, Fridays-Mondays, 10 a.m.-2 p.m. It's located within Airport Park at 500 Colchester Point Road. Parking and admission are free, although donations are always appreciated to help with upkeep of the building.





Recent Acquisitions




- The Colchester Historical Society is very happy to have recently received this **collection of rare photographs of Camp Norfleet**, circa 1931. It was a fine arts camp located off Clay Point Road and run by siblings Abram Leeper Norfleet (1901-1973), cellist; Catharine Marie Norfleet (1893-1955), violinist; and Helen Lucille Norfleet (1891-1974), pianist. According to Helen's obituary, the camp attracted international staff and campers.

Helen had made her concert debut with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra at the young age of 14. She also founded the Norfleet School of Individual Studies in New York City. Helen published several books of folk songs and music of Vermont, according to the obituary. At the time of her death, she had resided on Spear Street in South Burlington.

The Norfleet Trio was featured on national radio programs and performed chamber music throughout the United States and Canada. At some point in time, Camp Norfleet was located at Allenwood in South Burlington for several years, though we are uncertain of the exact dates. The Norfleet Camp in Colchester eventually became Buff Ledge Camp, and today the site operates as a privately owned horse farm. A quick internet search indicates the Norfleets also operated The Norfleet Trio Camp in Peterborough, New Hampshire, around 1935.

Local Historical Site Updates

- Colchester's oldest church, built in 1838, has a newly renovated steeple. Now known as the United Church of Colchester, its <u>Save Our Steeple</u> campaign raised approximately \$75,000, and the project was completed this spring. In addition, new steps with safety handrails were added to the front doors, steps to the front door of the parish house were replaced, and repairs were made to the sidewalk that leads from the driveway and parking lot to the front door.

- American Legion Post 91 added a Blue Star Memorial Marker and garden at a well-attended


Memorial Marker and garden at a well-attended dedication ceremony on May 27. The marker honors those who have served in the Armed Forces in defending the United States of America with courage and dedication. This type of marker became a prominent symbol during World War II

when it was seen on flags and banners in homes. The Federated Garden Clubs of Vermont helped raise the \$3,000 for the marker located at the Post at 3650 Roosevelt Highway. WCAX-TV and the Colchester Sun covered the story.

- The barracks at Fort Ethan Allen that once served as living quarters for the famous Buffalo Soldiers now provide modernized housing. The renovation project was a collaboration between




Champlain Housing Trust and Evernorth, resulting in 65 one-bedroom and studio apartments that currently rent for an average of \$1,200 per month including heat and hot water. Thanks and Congratulations

- Tom Mulcahy served for many years on the Colchester Select Board and was awarded this plaque in May to honor his faithful and dedicated service. The Resolution of Appreciation from the Select Board stated, in part: "Tom

spearheaded the efforts of the Colchester Historical Society to reclaim a long-forgotten 1815 schoolhouse discovered by the MacDonald family in 2000, moving the schoolhouse to a temporary location, raising money to move it to Airport Park, and restoring it with input from experts based on historical photographs and physical evidence, saving the oldest-known structure in Malletts Bay." As volunteer project manager, Tom played a major role in making the Colchester Log Schoolhouse the success it is today as a popular local museum and visitor center.

Colchester Students Learn Local History





Future historians? Only time will tell.

A fun group of Colchester Middle School students in Grades 6-8 recently toured the Parsonage with Historical Society president Bonnie Potter and the Colchester Log Schoolhouse with director Carol Reichard. The students were participating in a "Colchester treasure hunt," one of the short courses offered at the school for end-of-year studies. School librarian Rebecca Sofferman coordinated the effort to help the students learn a little about Colchester history. Helping out were Bill Crowley, special education teacher, and Kairie Murray, paraeducator.

The middle schoolers also learned how to perform genealogy research at the Burnham Memorial Library with librarian Meg Malone, visited the Village Cemetery to find the grave sites of notable local people, and had a hands-on lesson in cleaning headstones from town clerk Julie Graeter. The students were impressed by a visit to the Vermont National Guard Museum and Library, as well as a walking tour of Fort Ethan Allen where they had the opportunity to tour Vermont's oldest

radio station, WVMT, now housed in an historical building at the fort that once served as the barracks for the military band. It was a very busy and productive couple of days.

"They asked some great questions," said Bonnie Potter, Historical Society president, "and hopefully will be inspired to continue their own studies of Colchester's local history. Perhaps some of them will decide to participate in Vermont History Day in the spring," she added.
