Back to School, Back in Time

The end of summer means it's time for back to school. This photo shows students at play outside the old town hall on Main Street, which also served as a schoolhouse and was referred to as "District No. 1 School" or "The Colchester Academy."



In 1850, the school's male teachers were paid \$65 for 14 weeks of work, while female teachers were paid \$24 for 16 weeks. Wood for heat cost \$12.50, so to educate 77 students that year, \$99.50 was spent. The school tax for the year 1865-1866 was 40 cents in that district.

In Honor of Military Veterans



The 3rd U.S. Cavalry moved to Fort Ethan Allen in 1894 and arrived in two trains – one for the horses and the other for the men. On the event of the Spanish-American War in 1898, they were transferred, and the fort became a mobilization point for the Vermont National Guard.



Legislators John Stewart and Justin Morrill had persuaded the U.S. Congress in 1892 that a fort east of the Mississippi near Lake Champlain had strategic military importance. The Colchester site was ultimately selected for its accessibility to railroad links extending to the south and east.

Because of the stimulation it brought to the local economy, the stipulation that the land had


to be donated free of charge to the U.S. government drew the energetic support of Dr. W. Seward Webb of Shelburne and the Central Vermont Railroad, who, along with several other local business people, pledged money for the land purchase.

The fort was named after Ethan Allen, the leader of the Green Mountain Boys.
