

Brrrr! A Wintry Blast from the Past

One night back in 1923, Colchester Reef Lighthouse Keeper August Lorenz was working in the lantern room when he heard a huge crash and splintering wood. He dashed downstairs to find the southwest corner of the lighthouse split open by the pressure of tons of ice. Huge ice chunks protruded through the opening and flooded the kitchen floor. But within a few minutes, the wind reversed, the ice slid back, and all that was left of the near disaster was a gaping hole in the kitchen wall.

These days, of course, the incredible Colchester Reef Lighthouse is on display at the Shelburne Museum. Inside the structure, exhibits on Lake Champlain history, maritime history, and life at the lighthouse may be enjoyed.

Spellbound!

That's the best way to describe how members and quests reacted to our special Veterans' Day program in November. Rick Heh presented amazingly descriptive and detailed journal entries written by his Dad during World War II. Lt. Richard Heh served in the 351st Bomb Squad in the U.S. Air Force. His B-17 war plane was shot down over Belgium, and he was held as a prisoner of war for about a year at Stalag Luft III German prison camp.
