Plans and work are actively underway to provide some additional Colchester historical resources:




♦ A video tour of the Parsonage. Colchester Historical Society volunteers are partnering with Lake Champlain Access Television to create a video tour of one of Colchester's prominent historic buildings – the Parsonage on Main Street. The Parsonage was built in 1899 and was originally affiliated with the building next door, the Meeting House, which was once a Baptist Church. Over the years, the Parsonage served as the residence for several pastors and their families.

Eventually, that church merged with the First Congregational Church of Christ and later became the United Church of Colchester. In 1989, the Parsonage became the property of the Town of Colchester. While none of the furnishings are original to the home, Historical Society members have furnished it with period pieces and restored much of the interior. It's at the Parsonage where the Historical Society maintains its business office and holds most of its programs and meetings.

The Colchester Historical Society hopes this new video tour will provide a nice opportunity for people to "visit" the Parsonage and learn more about its role in our local history.

### Paddlewheel Wreckage Found

Local diver Gary Lefebvre recently discovered paddlewheel wreckage off Colchester Shoal in Lake Champlain. Chris Sabick, director of research and archaeology at the Lake Champlain Maritime Museum, identified the wreckage as the remains from an early steamboat, the *Phoenix*. The steamboat caught fire and sank 201 years ago.



Buffalo Soldiers, 1909 – 1913




U.S. Cavalry, 1917, at Fort Ethan Allen

### **An Image of Christmas Past**



The Christmas menu at Fort Ethan Allen in 1937 offered oyster stew and crackers, celery hearts, sweet pickles, roast Vermont turkey, oyster dressing, canned sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, and creamed peas. For dessert, chocolate layer cake, orange layer cake, blueberry pie, apple pie, assorted chocolate candies, ice cream, bananas, oranges, apples, and mixed nuts. Later, coffee and beer were offered – even cigarettes and cigars!
