#### **Our Facebook Followers Exceed 500**




Yay! Our dedicated Facebook page has exceeded 500 followers – we're at 546, to be exact. Followers from Colchester number 213, and there more than

# Register Now for Free Presentation: Colchester's Famous Buffalo Soldiers - February 18 at noon on Zoom



In July 1909, the Tenth United States Cavalry Regiment, one of four regular Army black regiments collectively known as the Buffalo Soldiers, arrived in Colchester to begin a four-year tour of duty at Fort Ethan Allen.


Their arrival alarmed the almost exclusively white population. Many people feared the presence of sizable numbers of African American soldiers in their community, and a bitter debate ensued over whether the city should adopt Jim Crow facilities.

For the next four years, the Tenth Cavalry would encounter similar reactions as it traveled throughout the Northeast and as far south as Winchester, Virginia. Wherever they went, the black soldiers faced fear and suspicion and had to demonstrate good behavior to win the acceptance of the white population.

The presenter is David Work, who holds a doctorate in American history. He currently teaches at Tacoma Community College in Washington.

# March is Women's History Month: Fanny Allen, 1784 - 1810



Frances (Fanny) Margaret Allen, daughter of Vermont's most famous Revolutionary War hero Ethan Allen, was the inspiration for the founding of Fanny Allen Hospital in Colchester. She was the first woman born in Vermont to enter the order of the Religious Hospitalliers of St. Joseph at the Hotel Dieu in Montreal.

Tuberculosis took her life at only age 26, but her memory was preserved in the hearts of the women of her congregation in Montreal as well as in the hearts of many Vermonters who were edified, inspired, and converted to a deeper faith by Fanny's life's example. The hospital is known today as the Fanny Allen Campus and is part of the UVM Medical Center.

Interestingly, Fanny Allen was not interred in the Fanny Allen Cemetery here in Colchester, but beneath the chapel of Hotel Dieu in Montreal.

## Town Receives Lighthouse Model



This beautiful replica of the Colchester Reef Lighthouse was built by Thomas C. Raub and recently donated to the Town of Colchester by the Thomas J. Raub family in memory of their son and brother, Bill. Tragically, Bill died at age 35 when his ultralight aircraft crashed at the Highgate airport in 1993.

Many years ago, Tom C. had made a similar version. Coming from a family of sailing enthusiasts, he had grown up with a special appreciation for Lake Champlain and its history. The lighthouse model was placed in the front yard of their home on West Lakeshore Drive. It was also once used by the Colchester Historical Society for its display at a meeting of Vermont's historical societies held in Tunbridge.

Its popularity prompted Tom C. to build a second lighthouse. That one was donated to the town in June of 2013, and the Historical Society became its steward. It was placed on the Main Street Parsonage lawn for display; however, Vermont weather was unkind to the lighthouse, and major restoration was needed.

Recently, Tom undertook that project. Upon closer examination, he realized the better plan would be to rebuild a new lighthouse from scratch. The new lighthouse model was delivered to the town administrative offices on December 16, 2020, where it will be on indoor display, along with a descriptive plague.

The actual Colchester Reef Lighthouse, was constructed in 1870-71 at a cost of \$24,500 – the most expensive light built on Lake Champlain. It served as the home and workplace of 11 successive keepers and their families. In 1933, the lighthouse was decommissioned and was abandoned. In 1952, the lighthouse was dismantled from its site on the lake and reconstructed at Shelburne Museum where it is on permanent display and open to the public.
