of amazing life-like carvings of birds by Bob Spear, formerly of Colchester. 

Upcoming Special Event – and You're Invited!



Saturday, August 12, 10 a.m. Dalton Drive, Fort Ethan Allen

Colchester has been selected to receive a new <u>Vermont Historic Roadside Marker</u>, and you are invited to attend the dedication and unveiling.

This historic marker will commemorate the First Special Service Force, activated on July 9, 1942, as a joint Canadian-United States force of three small regiments and a service battalion. The FSSF trained for a period of time at Fort Ethan Allen here in Colchester.

The event sounds like a festive one! Preliminary plans indicate there will be a speaker from the FSSF Association who will talk about the history of the FSSF. A group of singers will perform a musical tribute to Vermont, and the 40th Army Band will play "Frederick's Black Devils" written for the FSSF, followed by a trumpet fanfare. Then, the new historic marker will be unveiled.
