

◆ Several of our members participated in the "How to Clean Cemetery Monuments" workshop hosted by the Town Clerk's Office on September 9 at the Munson Cemetery. A team from the Vermont Old Cemetery Association demonstrated how to clean gravestones without damaging them. "It was interesting to walk through the cemetery and look at the ages of some of the stones," said Bob Furst. "I noticed one from as early as 1813. Our local cemeteries are certainly full of history."

◆ Colchester Historical Society was selected as the recipient of funds raised throughout the month of August from a program by Shaw's. We received \$1 for each reusable bag sold through **Shaw's GIVE BACK Reusable Bag Program** and gleaned a total of \$298. Program Manager Kimberly Monaco reported that we were the highest-earning nonprofit by more than \$100 and praised our promotional efforts to help make the campaign a success. The Town of Colchester is proud and honored to have received a Vermont Roadside Historic Marker commemorating the First Special **Service Force (FSSF)**. The unveiling of the marker and a special dedication event was held on August 12. In addition to speakers, the ceremony included a performance by a specially formed choir. The anthem, "Vermont is A State I Love", was specially composed by Gene Childers, representing the FSSF Association. The 40th Army Band played a lively march entitled "Frederick's Black Devils" by Paul Murtha. Attendees at the event included many FSSF Association members and families from around the United States and Canada, as well as an honor guard, bagpipers, a military chaplain, local citizens, and dignitaries. At the base of this new historic marker was an FSSF wreath, as well as vases of red, white and blue flowers, each bouquet honoring a specific FSSFfallen veteran. "It was a very moving ceremony," said Bonnie Potter, President of the Colchester Historical Society. "I'll never forget it."

This historic marker stands tall on Dalton Avenue at Fort Ethan Allen Park. The text on the marker states: "The FSSF was formed in 1942 as the only joint U.S.-Canadian unit in World War II. Many Vermonters volunteered to serve. Led by U.S. Army Col. Robert T. Frederick, the FSSF trained rigorously in Montana, Virginia, and at Fort Ethan Allen. Known as the "Black Devils," the FSSF

distinguished itself during the Italian Campaign at Monte la Difensa and Anzio. It was the first unit deployed to southern France and later disbanded in 1944. It earned considerable honors from four nations for accomplishments during the war, including a U.S. Congressional Gold Medal. The FSSF is a predecessor to the modern special operations forces in service today."

Another Busy Summer at Colchester's Historic Log Schoolhouse

The summer of 2023 did not disappoint. A total of 1,282 people enjoyed visiting the <u>Colchester Log Schoolhouse</u>, many of whom were local residents who had never seen it before. Others were from all around the United States and several foreign countries.

During the month of June, Michelle and Jack Penca offered fun and educational "Make and Take" classes for children ages seven to ten. The class topics were "Codes and Ciphers," "Old Time Toys," and "Math Games." The students were excited and proud about their new expertise and to take home their projects.

Also this summer, some much-needed repairs and upgrades were made to the Log Schoolhouse building. An anonymous donor generously provided funds to repair water damage, and a new accessible ramp was constructed at the entryway.

Our fabulous host volunteers did a wonderful job of ensuring that the Log Schoolhouse was open each weekend. They will be treated to Carol Reichard's popular "Soup Supper" one evening this fall.

The Log Schoolhouse is located at Airport Park on Colchester Point Road and is open throughout the summer, Fridays – Mondays, 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. This lovely little museum showcases our town's history and heritage. It takes visitors back in time to an early Colchester one-room school, before computers, cell phones, and even before indoor

plumbing! Volunteer hosts are always needed on the summer weekends, and hours are very flexible.
